Saving Lives and Rewriting their Future

Roo's Rescue

Roo dealt with her fair share of heartache before arriving at the SPCA. This poor cat was rushed to our Rescue Center after a utility worker in Sleepy Hollow found her outside alone and freezing. Fortunately, the worker heard Roo's cries and coaxed her out of a ditch, where she was huddled up next to a lukewarm pipe.

Immediately upon intake, the SPCA's veterinary team examined Roo and discovered that three of her four limbs were underdeveloped. To stabilize herself and move, she used one of her forearms like a little crutch. While our team was relieved that she did not appear to be in any pain, a sad realization soon set in. Roo was likely abandoned by her previous owner, as it's highly unlikely that she wandered off on her own. It breaks our hearts knowing how vulnerable and scared she must have been fending for herself in the freezing cold.

Our staff named this sweet girl Roo (short for kangaroo) since she hops and stands on her back legs. Fortunately, after receiving medical treatment and care from our SPCA team, Roo hopped her way right into a loving forever home! Thank you for supporting us so that we could support Roo.

Nora's Journey - Adopted after 410 days

Many of you may recognize Nora whose rescue was captured on video and viewed by millions of animal lovers worldwide. This beautiful Rhodesian Ridgeback mix was heartlessly abandoned by her owner in the SPCA's parking lot with her four puppies. Scared and confused, this sweet mom trembled when two of our team members cautiously approached her. Nora's leash was tied to a small carrier with two of her babies inside while her other two puppies were dumped in an open cardboard box. Nora's story could have had a devastating outcome, but fortunately, this beautiful family of five was safely secured and quickly rushed inside our Rescue Center.

After receiving proper veterinary care and an abundance of TLC at the SPCA, all four puppies were quickly adopted. Sadly, Nora's journey has not been easy. Shortly after her arrival, Nora underwent two lifesaving surgeries to remove tumors that her former owner had neglected to treat. She also underwent entropion surgery to prevent her eyelashes from scratching her eyes. Thanks to supporters like you, we were able to provide her with the medical care she so desperately needed.

While the emotional scars of her past may always be with her, Nora has made huge strides over the past year. After spending time in a loving foster home, Nora gained confidence and learned to trust, which led to her finding the most amazing forever family. It took 410 days to find her perfect match but it was 100% worth the wait! We are so grateful to everyone who supported Nora's journey at the SPCA—it truly takes a village!

Bringing Adoptions on the Road

We are proud to share that the SPCA is the proud owner of Westchester County's FIRST EVER mobile adoption unit! Shelters nationwide have been in crisis post-pandemic with adoption rates on the decline. By evolving the adoption process in a more accessible way, we've successfully placed hundreds of dogs and cats into loving families throughout the local community thanks to this innovative mobile program.

The official ribbon-cutting photo was taken after our first mobile adoption unit event at the Chappaqua Farmer's Market, where nine dogs found their forever homes, including a senior terrier mix who'd be in our care for six months. SPCA staff and volunteers were thrilled to drive back to the Rescue Center that day



with an empty vehicle! We're looking forward to the many happy tails to come and are incredibly grateful to the supporters who made this dream a reality.

Quigley's Happy Tail

Speaking of our mobile adoption unit, we can't forget to mention one of our best adoptions of 2024. Quigley, a 4-year-old pit bull mix was in the SPCA's care for 1,224 days...that is, until he attended one of our mobile adoption events. Quigley was overlooked at the Rescue Center time and time again. While his gentle, loving nature was evident to everyone at the SPCA, we needed adopters to see his potential outside of a shelter environment.

Fast-forward to our mobile adoption unit event at the Scarsdale Fire House. Quigley arrived at the event accompanied by one of his favorite volunteers and he "worked the crowd" like never before! That's when he met the most incredible family in attendance, "just to look." Quigley took to them immediately and vice versa...it was kismet. Your support enables us to care for dogs like Quigley, whose happily ever after sometimes takes a bit longer. His story serves as a powerful reminder to never lose hope!



Protecting Westchester's Animals

SPCA's Humane Law Enforcement Unit (HLE)



The SPCA's HLE Unit receives no government funding, depending solely on contributions from individuals and foundations in our community and beyond. As the sole agency

authorized to enforce animal cruelty laws in Westchester County, SPCA officers conduct investigations, seize victims of cruelty and neglect, and make arrests. We depend on your generosity to keep our four-legged family members safe and to ensure they have a voice.

In February 2024, SPCA Westchester's Humane Law Enforcement Unit responded to a distressing call from a White Plains landlord, resulting in the rescue of 86 cats. Neighbors had reported a "deathly smell" coming from the apartment and when SPCA officers arrived they discovered these poor cats living in a small apartment in deplorable conditions. Most of the cats were severely dehydrated and suffering from upper respiratory and eye infections. One cat had recently given birth to a tiny kitten, found clinging to life on the cold, soiled floor amid mounds of feces. Despite overwhelming conditions, our team worked tirelessly to trap the cats and transport them to the SPCA's Rescue Center, where they began their critical journey of healing.

One of the most haunting images from this rescue is of that tiny, fragile kitten. Now known as Sir Meatball, his transformation into a healthy, playful cat is a powerful example of the lifesaving impact of timely intervention and care.

SPCA Arrests Dog Sitter

Once again, the SPCA's Humane Law Enforcement Unit demonstrated its unwavering commitment to animal protection with the rescue of Champ and Pretty Girl, two young pit bulls brutally abused by their dog sitter in New Rochelle. A disturbing video showed 35-year-old Roger Andrews of Yonkers whipping the dogs with a rope leash, then kicking, punching, and throwing them while they screamed out in pain.

Thanks to a quick, coordinated response from SPCA officers—led by Ernest Lungaro and assisted by Yonkers Police—Andrews was arrested the same day and charged with animal cruelty. Miraculously, Champ and Pretty Girl did not suffer serious injuries.

Because of your support, the SPCA's Humane Law Enforcement Unit was able to save Champ and Pretty Girl and arrest their abuser. Together, we gave these two innocent dogs hope for a bright future that will only be filled with love and kindness.





Cody's Clinic

The SPCA's Cody's Clinic is the only low-cost animal hospital in Westchester County and offers deeply discounted rates to ensure pet owners have access to veterinary care. Cody's Clinic also supports our homeless feral cat community through a rigorous trap/neuter/vaccinate/return (TNVR) program. With veterinary expenses on the rise, your support is critical so that we can continue to offer affordable pricing to the people and animals who depend on us.

Sable's New Beginning



Sable, a sweet stray, was rushed into the SPCA after she was discovered in distress by a Good Samaritan in New Rochelle. It was evident that she'd been living on the streets for quite some time as she was extremely skinny, dehydrated and infested with fleas. Upon examination by our Cody's Clinic veterinary team, Sable's front leg quickly became a concern. Not only was she unable to bear any weight on it, but it appeared to be fractured in more than one place, causing her extreme pain.

While it was clear that poor Sable had been injured, her x-rays revealed something even more disturbing than we could have ever imagined--this innocent stray had been shot numerous times with a bb gun. Many of the pellets were still lodged in her leg which caused multiple fractures. Sadly, her leg was too far gone to save. However, thanks to your support and the efforts of our Cody's Clinic team, Sable's leg was safely amputated, relieving her of pain and giving her a new beginning. Shortly after surgery, Sable was adopted and has the most loving new home a kitty could ask for!

Waiving Fees for Pet Owners in Need

Thanks to the incredible support of our friends at Tito's Handmade Vodka, Cody's Clinic was able to provide FREE spay/neuter and wellness services to qualified low-income residents. Through Tito's "Passion Projects" grant, the SPCA supported 102 companion animals whose owners receive a form of public assistance and could not afford veterinary care.

One of the pet parents emailed us to express her gratitude: "I unexpectedly took in a sweet, neglected dog named Grace. SPCA Westchester immediately responded to my plea, and I was approved for financial assistance for Grace's spay and vaccines. She received top-quality care and I'm so grateful that everything was done at no cost. It was a tremendous relief."


